Nevada Roadmap Summary		
Effective Roadmap Policy	2022 Policy Snapshot	
Expanded Income Eligibility for Health Insurance	138%	Nevada is one of 39 states that has expanded Medicaid eligibility under the Affordable Care Act; thus, parents earning up to 138% of the FPL are eligible for Medicaid coverage in NV.
Reduced Administrative Burden for SNAP	6 months	Nevada offers two of the three policies to reduce administrative burden to most families. The state offers simplified reporting and an online application to most families, but only offers 6-month recertification intervals.
Paid Family Leave Program of at Least 6 Weeks	0 weeks	Nevada does not have a statewide paid family leave program.
State Minimum Wage of \$10.00 or Greater	\$10.50	This year, the state minimum wage in Nevada increased from \$9.75 to \$10.50 (for employees without qualifying health insurance; \$9.50 with qualifying health insurance), and is scheduled to increase to \$12.00 (\$11.00 for employees with health insurance) in 2024.
Refundable State Earned Income Tax Credit of at Least 10%	No EITC	Nevada does not have a state EITC, and the state does not have an income tax, which is the typical mechanism used to finance and provide administrative structure for a state EITC.
State has adopted and fully implemented the policy	State has newly adopted and fully implemented the policy since October 1, 2021	
Effective Roadmap Strategy	2022 Strategy Snapshot	
Comprehensive Screening and Connection Programs	0	Families had access to 0 evidence-based comprehensive screening and connection programs in Nevada in 2021.
Child Care Subsidies	117.9%	Nevada's base reimbursement rates cover 117.9% of the true cost of providing base-quality care for infants in center-based care.
Group Prenatal Care	3	Nevada served pregnant people in 3 group prenatal care sites across the state in 2021.
Evidence-Based Home Visiting Programs	0.8%	Nevada served an estimated 0.8% of children under age 3 in families with incomes of less than 150% of the FPL in the state's home visiting programs in 2019.
Early Head Start	4.8%	Approximately 4.8% of income-eligible infants and toddlers had access to Early Head Start programs in Nevada in 2019.
Early Intervention Services	4.0%	Nevada served 4.0% of its birth-to-3 population in Early Intervention services (Part C) over the course of a year (2020-2021).
