- In the latest monthly update, the OELD team hosted two webinars and has another scheduled for March to inform providers about the advantages and expectations of the 12-month LearnERS program. LearnERS is an online training program designed for self-paced learning, aligning the Environment Rating Scales (ERS) with best practices in Early Childhood Education (ECE), and offering teachers and coaches a wealth of ideas and resources to enhance their teaching. As of March 1st, 60% of the selected providers have signed the agreement, and 51% of the available LearnERS licenses have been allocated to these providers. The rollout process is ongoing, and we anticipate more providers joining this month.
- Nevada's QRIS volunteered to participate in a pilot review/implementation of the Child Care and Development Fund Equity Assessment. The purpose of the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) program is to help families with low incomes gain access to high-quality child care so adults can work and their children can be supported to reach their full potential (CCDF Program Final Rule, 2016). Despite this aim, there remain groups of children and families in the U.S. who are systematically left behind, as evidenced by persistent gaps in child development, school readiness and family economic security. This toolkit provides resources for training and technical assistance (T/TA) providers in the Child Care Technical Assistance Network (CCTAN) to help State, Territory, and Tribal CCDF Lead Agencies take steps towards conducting equity assessments to inform policy design, planning, implementation, and monitoring efforts aiming to close those gaps.
- Nevada's QRIS plans to incorporate insights from the equity tool into its revision of the current model. This effort aims to support the early childhood education (ECE) landscape, prioritizing elements crucial to children's care. Approval has been granted for Nevada to receive technical

assistance from the National Center on Early Childhood Quality Assurance (NCECQA) to navigate this review process.

- The 2023-2024 formulations of the COVID-19 vaccines from Novavax, Moderna, and Pfizer are available. Those eligible are:
 - Novavax – available for those 12 years of age and older who are at least two months out from their last COVID-19 vaccine
 - Moderna – available for those 6 months of age and older who are at least two months out from their last COVID-19 vaccine
 - Pfizer – available for those 6 months of age and older who are at least two months out from their last COVID-19 vaccine

- Flu vaccines are also available and safe to receive at the same time as your COVID-19 vaccine. Visit [vaccines.gov](https://www.vaccines.gov) for a location near you
- RSV protection for both pregnant people and infants has arrived.
 - Abrysvo (Pfizer) – Recommended for both pregnant people 32-36 weeks pregnant during RSV season. Abrysvo (Pfizer) protects infants in utero when given to the expectant parent at least two weeks before delivery; thus, in most cases, the infant does not require an additional RSV vaccine.
 - Nirsevimab (Beyfortus) – Recommended for all infants eight months or younger during or entering their first RSV season AND some young children. Infants younger than eight months of age will not need nirsevimab – an RSV preventative antibody - if born 14 or more days after their birthing parent received their (Abrysvo [Pfizer]) RSV vaccine while still pregnant, in most cases. As nirsevimab supplies are limited, providers are encouraged to recommend and provide prenatal RSV vaccination strongly. If the infant's birthing parent received Abrysvo 14+ days from giving birth, nirsevimab should not be administered. The protection offered by nirsevimab lasts for up to five months.

If one is eligible for all three, it is safe to receive the COVID-19, Flu and RSV vaccines at the same time.

Home Visitor Training on oral health was provided at the Home Visitor Statewide meeting. Training included prevention of childhood caries, baby bottle caries, importance of oral health during pregnancy, importance of having first dental check up by 1 year of age, proper nutrition and oral hygiene tips. Oral hygiene supplies were provided to Nevada Home Visiting, including baby oral care kits, toddler toothbrushes and educational materials.

The Oral Health Program is applying for the HRSA-24-039 Maternal and Child Health- Improving Oral Health Integration Demonstration Project. The purpose of the grant is to increase access to preventative oral health services for pregnant Nevada residents and children under the age of 1. Nevada will increase access to care for the target population by integrating preventative oral health care into primary care services along with addressing Nevada's policy and practices that can impact access to preventive oral health care, providing education and outreach to medical and dental providers and enhancing oral health surveillance to address social determinants of health.

Nevada Department of Health Care Financing and Policy, Medicaid Dental Services Program's effort to reduce the prevalence of tooth decay among Nevada's children and youth, through partnerships with schools statewide to deliver dental sealants and fluoride varnish using school-based oral health prevention programs. The HRSA ECCS Health Integration initiative is aligned with the goals and objectives of the ECAC 2022-2024 Strategic Plan. As such, much of the project activities are updated through the ECAC Subcommittee Work Plan document.

- The schedule for the 2024 **ECCS Leadership** meeting has been set, please contact Tiffany Olivas for more information if you are interested in participating.
- Content is being finalized for the **First 5 Nevada website**. Six Parent focus groups for feedback on the Early Childhood Programs Eligibility Portal were completed in February. Website and portal are set to launch late March / early April. Interested partners are encouraged to join the Pre-Launch Partner Information Session scheduled for Wednesday March 27, 2024 1-2 pm: <https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/First5NV>.
- The Fiscal Mapping Project / **Early Childhood Fiscal Map** continues to progress. The Children’s Funding Project (CFP) is completing a comprehensive list of the identified early childhood funding streams to align with early childhood system sectors. The early childhood fiscal map will be ready to add to the existing fiscal map in March 2024. The Gap Analysis project is on track to be completed by the end of March 2024. CFP will be prepared to present the EC Fiscal Map and Gap Analysis to the ECAC at the May meeting. The complete report, including analysis of revenue sources, will be complete by December 2024.
- Denise Tanata (ECCS Advisor) attended a meeting in February with other key stakeholders and Senator Nguyen regarding Nevada’s Early Childhood System. Work is in progress to draft a white paper to establish a **Governor’s Office or Department for EC Systems** (based off of AB113) to potentially present in the 2025 Legislative Session.
- An Advisory Committee was developed to provide oversight on the **First 5 Nevada Leadership Academy**. Currently there are multiple nominated individuals to participate. Applications will close on 3/20 and the first meeting is scheduled for April 24th (in Reno). The First 5 Nevada Leadership Academy is a cohort-style six month immersive training program for emerging or existing leaders within the early childhood system. The purpose of this training series is to equip professionals with the knowledge, expertise and resources necessary to support the development and sustainability of a comprehensive, coordinated early childhood system in Nevada.
- **The Guinn Center** is working on the development of a white paper regarding the establishment of a Governor’s Office or Department for EC Systems (based off of AB113).
- Continued alignment with The Children’s Advocacy Committee through participation of an Early Childhood Systems Panel during their **2024 Winter Policy Summit**.
- The **CIRS Workgroup** continues to meet monthly. We are currently focused on identifying aligned projects (HRSA/MCH) with a priority or goal to establish a CIRS. Next steps will likely be working with the identified HRSA/MCH projects (including the ECCS EC CHW Program; Northern NV Hopes’ Developmental Screening Project; CoMagine Health’s Maternity Medical Home Project; and potentially DCFS’ I/T Court Program) to assess needs, participate in demos, and determine costs for implementation. We will be revisiting opportunities to connect with Unite Us as a potential CIRS vendor for these projects.

- With the new school year starting, the CCPAC took the month of August off to focus on our child care programs. However, in early August Senator Cortez-Masto's staff reached out to request a tour of some Northern Nevada child care programs. We took them to tour Under the Magic Pine Tree in Reno and talked about the background process and made a recommendation for the Administration of Children and Families (ACF) to ensure all states have an up-to-date list of the out-of-state process for requesting child care background checks for early childhood educators who recently moved to Nevada.
- We also visited Nancy Konopucki's licensed home-based child care program in Reno. We discussed how the stabilization grants made a positive impact in the programs who received the money and what we expect now that there are no more stabilization grants available, which is an increase in tuition rates for children in licensed child care. The event included rich panel discussions from a range of community and national partners, elected officials, and state agencies working to identify and support policies and programs that produce the best outcomes for Nevada’s children. The Children’s Advocacy Alliance would like to thank all participants and partners who made this day a success. We will be reviewing evaluations to continue to improve and build on what we learned for next year.</p> <p>CAA will be presenting alongside other key early childhood partners at the Interim Legislative Committee on Education Mar 20, 2024 to share key policy recommendations in the areas of early childhood systems, early care and education, maternal and child health, and economic well-being. Identifying and Leveraging Team Strengths

What are you best at? How do you feel when you have the opportunity to do that? How often are you given the chance to do that? Unfortunately, in the workplace, only one-third of staff say they have the opportunity to do what they do best every day. This leads to increased staff dissatisfaction, burnout, and turnover. To prevent this, it is important that you first identify and then leverage your staff’s strengths to increase satisfaction, performance, and retention.
